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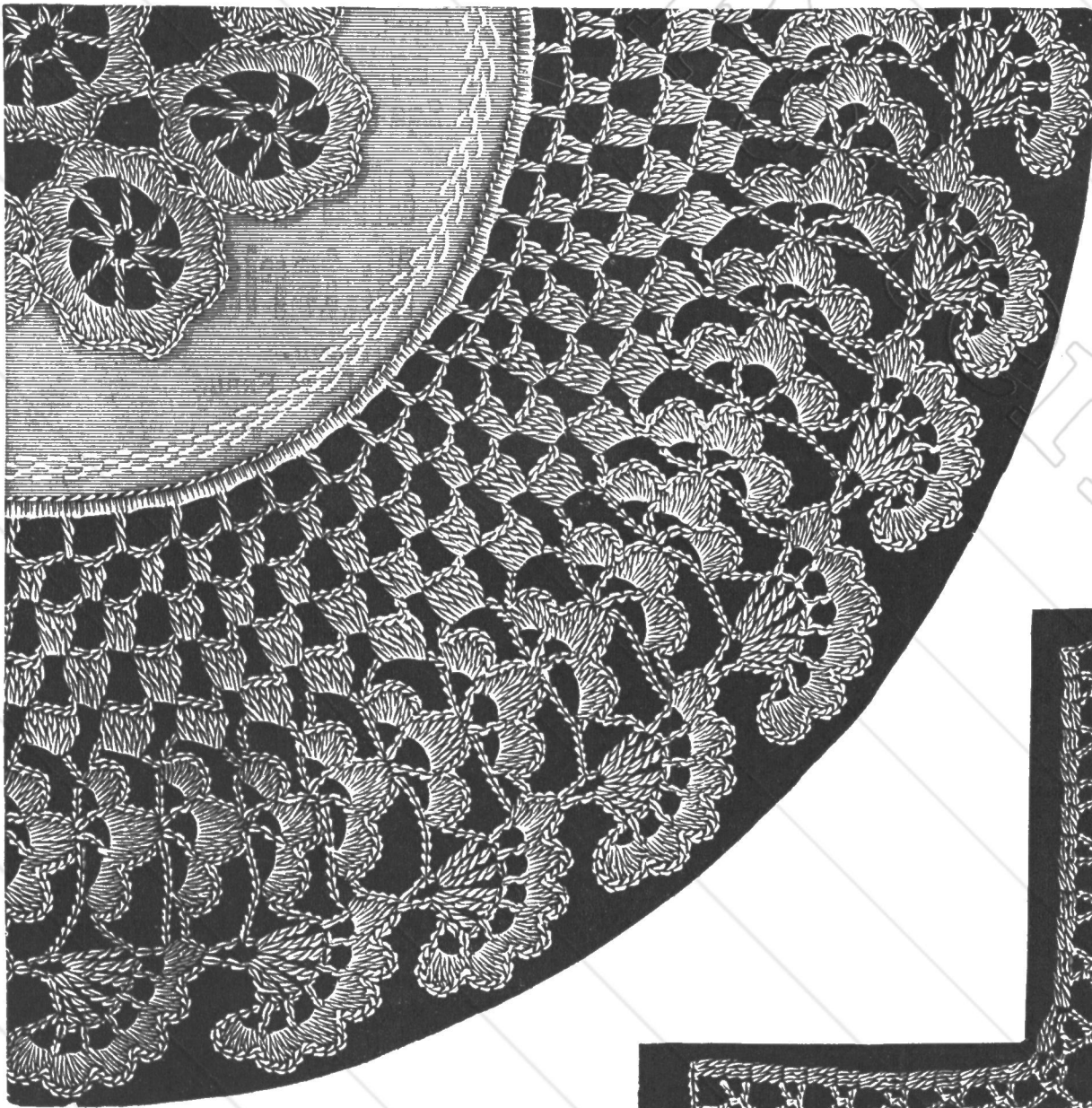
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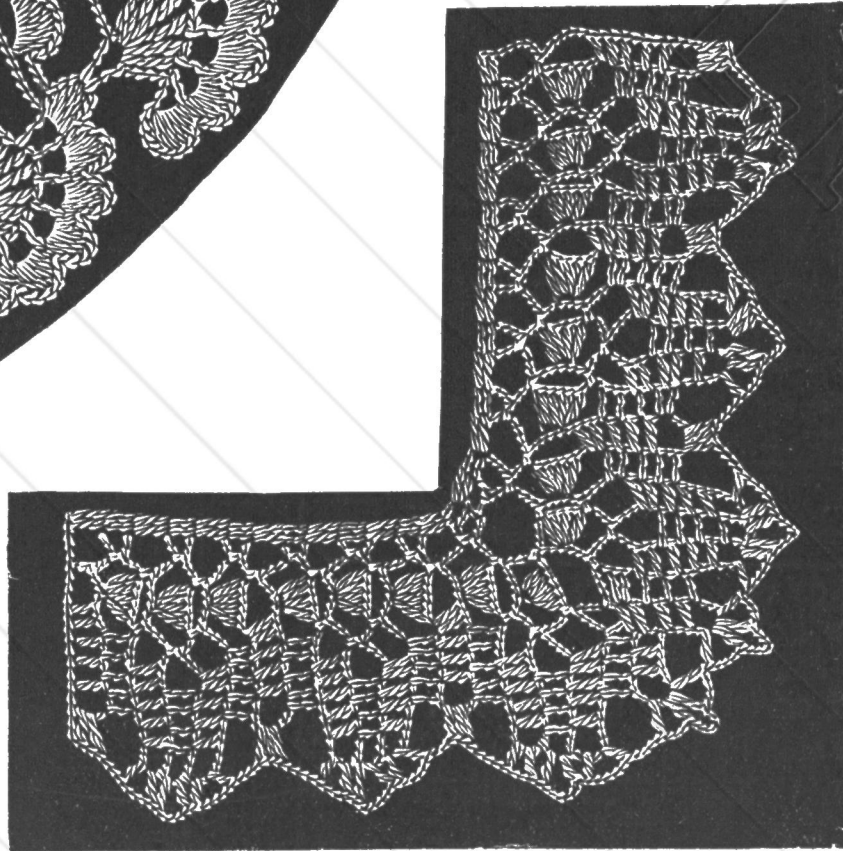

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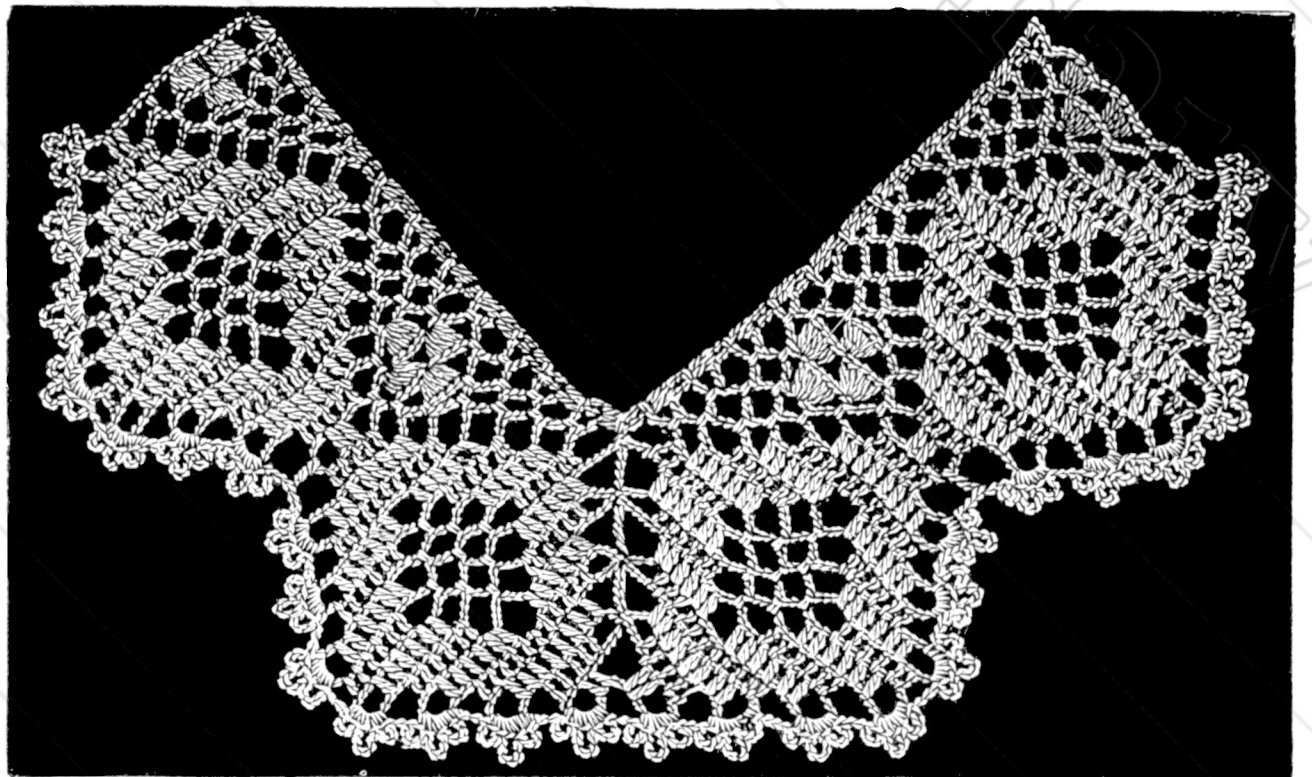
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Shell and Diamond Lace.

FOR trimming aprons, children's frocks and pinafores, few laces will prove more effective than the one illustrated here. It has the advantage also of being firm and solid, with no details about it that are likely to become spoilt in the laundry. A medium size of cotton is the best suited for it. The lace is worked shortways, and completed afterwards with a row of picots along the lower vandyked edge.

Commence with 31 chain. **1st row**—Miss nine, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 5 chain, miss three, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, miss three, 5 treble in the next stitch, 3 chain, miss three, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, miss one, 2 treble on the last two stitches. **2nd row**—3 chain (to serve as one treble), 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the loop before the group of treble, 3 chain, 5 treble in the third chain of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of three chain, 5 chain, 1 treble in the third of the next five chain, 1 chain, miss 1, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble between the two treble of the last row, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next chain, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble. **3rd row**—12 chain, 1 treble into the third of the twelve chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * six times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 2 treble. **4th row**—3 chain, 1 treble 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 treble in the third of the next five chain, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, repeat eight times from *. **5th row**—12 chain, 1 treble into the third of the twelve chain, * 1 chain, miss one 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, miss three treble, 1 treble in the next hole, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 2 treble. **6th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 treble in the third of the next five chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the loop of five chain, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, then 1 chain and 1 treble five times. **7th row**—12 chain, 1 treble into the third of the twelve chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of five chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, 1 chain and 1 treble five times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of chain, 3 chain, 2 treble at the end. **8th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 treble in the third of the next five chain, 1 chain and 1 treble five times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of five chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble in the next small space, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times. **9th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble in the space between the next two treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 treble in the next

times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 3 chain, 2 treble at the end. **10th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of five chain, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the middle of the next loop of five chain, 5 chain, 1 treble in the middle of the next loop, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times. **11th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble in the hole between the next two treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 treble in the third chain of the next loop, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 3 chain, 2 treble at the end. **12th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of five chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * nine times (three treble should be in the loop of five chain of last row). **13th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * six times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 2 treble. **14th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 5 treble in third chain of next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times. **15th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain,

5 treble in the second chain of next loop, 3 chain, 5 treble in the second chain of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 2 treble. Repeat from the 2nd row.

If a corner is required begin it after a repetition of the 8th row. **1st row of Corner**—Work as in the 9th row as far as the end of the second set of treble and chain. **2nd row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 treble in the next loop, 1 chain, 1 treble in the same loop, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times. **3rd row**—Like the 11th row as far as the end of the second set of treble and chain. **4th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * nine times as in the 12th row. **5th row**—Like the 13th row, as far as the end of the set of treble and chain. **6th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times. **7th row**—7 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble.

Now for the **8th row of Corner**—Do not turn the work over, but hold it so that the straight edge of lace runs along (not across) the forefinger of the left hand; 12 chain, 1 treble into the third chain, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 6 chain, 1 double crochet into the projecting loop of chain at the end of the 7th row of corner. Turn in every future row of the corner as usual at the end. **9th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the third of the preceding six chain, 1 chain, 1 treble into the first of these chain, 1 chain, 1 treble between the two treble of the last row, then 1 chain and 1 treble twice into the loop at the end. **10th row**—12 chain, 1 treble in the third chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * six times, the last two treble being in the loop of chain at the end, 6 chain, 1 four-fold treble (cotton four times round the hook) over the double crochet of the 8th row of corner, 1 double crochet into the projecting loop of chain at the end of the 5th row of corner. **11th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the third of the preceding six chain, 1 chain, 1 treble into the first of the six chain, * 1 chain, 1 treble between the two treble of the last row; repeat from * six times, then 1 chain and 1 treble twice into the loop at the end. **12th row**—12 chain, 1 treble into the third chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, miss three treble, 1 treble, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times, 6 chain, 1 four-fold treble, as before, over the double crochet of the 10th row, 1 double crochet into the loop at the end of the 3rd row of the corner. **13th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the third of preceding 6 chain, 1 chain, 1 treble into the first of these six chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times. **14th row**—12 chain, 1 treble into the third of the twelve chain, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * four times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, ** 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from ** four times, 6 chain, 1 four-fold treble into the side of the double crochet of the 12th row, 1 double crochet into the next projecting loop of chain, 1 slip-stitch into the edge of the last row of lace before beginning the corner. Turn as usual and work the 8th row of lace, continuing the directions until the next corner is required.

When the rest of the lace is finished, work as follows along the lower edge; * 1 double crochet into one of the loops of chain at the margin, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the same loop, 7 chain, 1 double crochet into the same loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the same loop, 3 chain; repeat from * all along. When the space between two vandykes is reached, work 3 chain, 1 long treble into the edge of the lace—this will be into the loop at the end of one of the rows in which there are two groups of five treble—then 3 chain, and work from the first * round the scallop as usual.



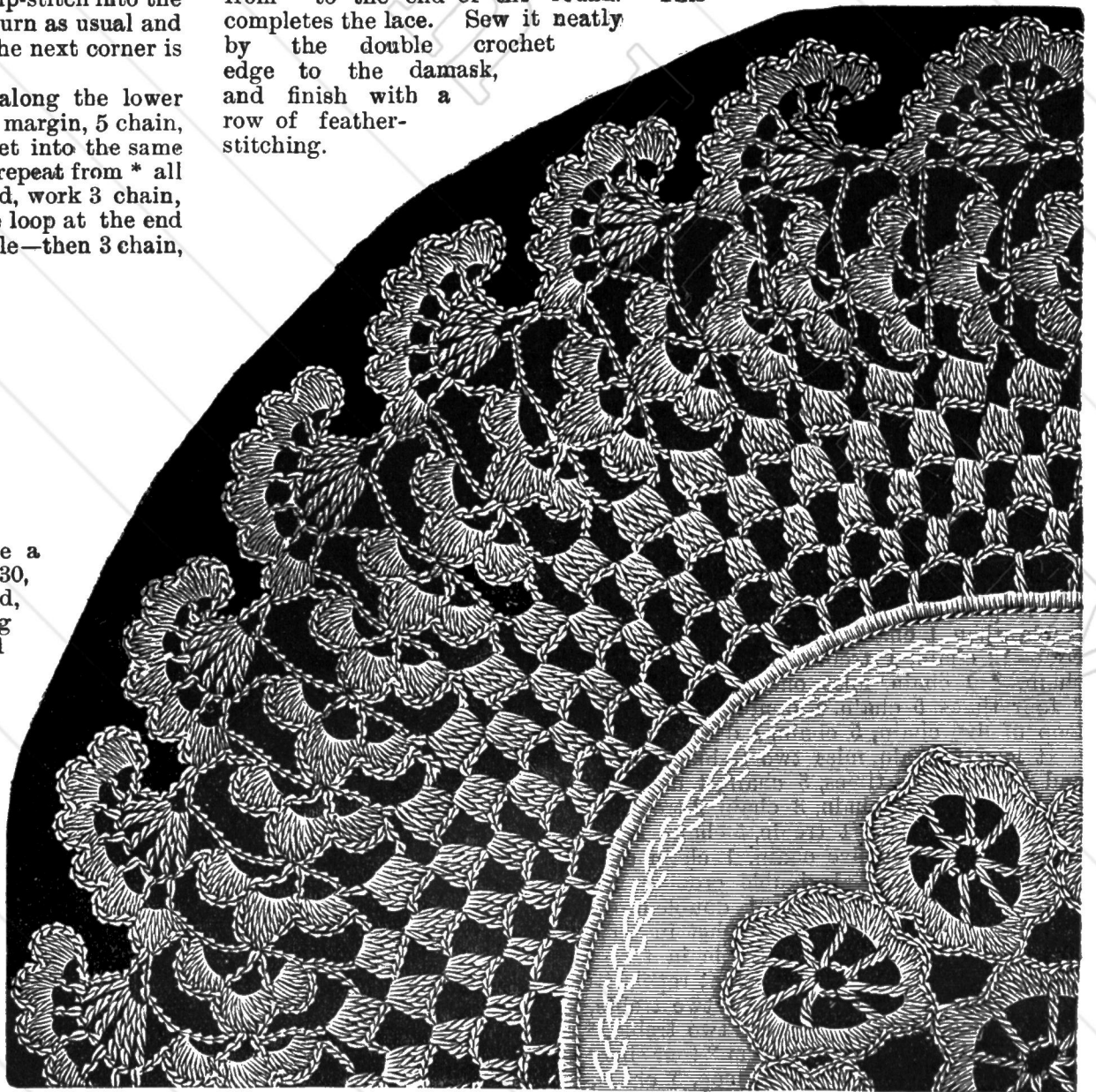
Star d'Oyley.



THE materials required for this pretty d'Oyley are a piece of linen damask, Coats's crochet cotton, No. 30, and a steel hook. To get the centre quite round, take a plate the size wanted, lay it on the wrong side of the damask and mark round lightly with a lead pencil. Then cut by this mark. Next put the centre pattern on the centre of the damask and sew it neatly round. Make a narrow hem all round the damask, then sew on the lace for the border. Finish off with a line of feather-stitching. The damask measures $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches across when hemmed; the d'Oyley when finished measures 9 inches. For the centre pattern work a ring of 8 chain. **1st round**—4 chain for long treble, 2 chain, 1 long treble (thread twice over the needle) over the ring, 2 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 2 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 2 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 2 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 2 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 2 chain, slip-stitch into the first four chain. **2nd round**—Into each of the eight spaces of two chain work 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet; finish off the thread firmly with a needle. Round this star work eight stars the same as directed, joining one star to

each point of the centre star, and to each other by the long treble on a point on one star to the long treble on a point on the next star, leaving one free cluster between each star round the centre star. This completes the centre pattern. Cut the centre of the damask into eight scallops to fit the crochet, turn up the scalloped edges evenly on to the right side, and hem the crochet pattern neatly down.

For the **Border**—Work 16 chain. **1st row**—1 long treble into the tenth chain from the needle, 3 chain, 1 long treble into the same stitch, 3 chain, 1 long treble into the same stitch, 3 chain, 1 treble into the last chain, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch. **2nd row**—* 4 chain for long treble, 6 long treble with 1 chain between each over the first space; 4 chain, 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the next space between two long treble; 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 3 chain, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the next space; 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the next space. **3rd row**—10 chain, 1 long treble into the space of three chain between two long treble of the previous row, 3 long treble with three chain between each over the same space, 4 chain, 1 treble over the first space on the scallop, 2 chain, 1 treble over each of the next five spaces, 2 chain, 1 treble over the same space as last treble. **4th row**—1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over each of the first six spaces on the scallop; 4 chain, 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the next space between two long treble; 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 3 chain, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the next space; 1 double crochet, 2 treble, 1 long treble, 2 treble, 1 double crochet over the last space. **5th row**—10 chain, 4 long treble with three chain between each over the space of three chain between two long treble, 4 chain, 1 treble into the long treble on the first point on the scallop, 3 chain, another treble in the same space; repeat from * at the beginning of the second row. After enough lace is worked for the border, join it firmly. Work round the top of the lace the following rounds. **1st round**—Join the thread to a space of ten chain, and work 5 treble over this space, 3 chain, 5 treble over the next space, * 3 chain, 5 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **2nd round**—3 chain, 4 treble over the first space of the previous round, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, * 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **3rd round**—3 chain, 3 treble over the first space, 3 chain, 3 treble over the next space, * 3 chain, 3 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **4th round**—3 chain, 2 treble over the first space, 3 chain, 2 treble over the next space, * 3 chain, 2 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **5th round**—3 chain, 1 treble over the first space, 3 chain, 1 treble over the next space, * 3 chain, 1 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **6th round**—4 double crochet over the first space, 4 double crochet over the next space, * 4 double crochet over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. This completes the lace. Sew it neatly by the double crochet edge to the damask, and finish with a row of feather-stitching.



Star d'Oyley.

Plate d'Oyley with Star Border.



OUR illustration shows a d'oyley with a handsome border of large stars. A round piece of damask linen, measuring $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches across when hemmed, with a large crochet star and a line of small rings, is used for the centre. Use Coats's crochet cotton, No. 24 or 30, with a fine steel hook. The d'oyley when finished measures 10 inches across. Begin with the centre pattern. Work 8 chain, join into a ring by a slip-stitch. **1st round**—4 chain for long treble, 1 chain, 1 long treble (thread twice over the needle) over the ring, 1 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, 1 chain, 1 long treble over the ring, * 1 chain, 1 long treble over the ring; repeat from * till there are twelve long treble round the ring, then 1 chain, slip-stitch into the first four chain. **2nd round**—1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the first space of one chain between two long treble, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the next space of one chain, * 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the next space of one chain; repeat from * all round. **3rd round**—9 chain, 1 double crochet between the first two picots of three chain, 9 chain, 1 double crochet between the next two picots, * 9 chain, 1 double crochet between the next two picots; repeat from * till there are twelve points of nine chain. Finish off the thread with a needle. Now work a ring of 8 chain, 3 chain for treble, 5 treble into the ring, draw the thread through one of the points of nine chain on the star, 6 treble into the ring, 10 chain, slip-stitch into the eighth chain from the needle, 3 chain for treble, 5 treble into the ring, draw the thread through the next point of nine chain on the star, 6 treble into the ring, 10 chain, * slip-stitch into the eighth chain from the needle, 3 chain for treble, 5 treble into the ring, draw the thread through the next point of nine chain on the star, 6 treble into the ring, 10 chain; repeat from * till there are twelve rings joined to the twelve points of nine chain on the star; turn, and into the unworked part of the first ring work 12 treble, slip-stitch into the first three chain for treble, ** 12 treble into the next ring, slip-stitch into the last three chain; repeat from ** till all the unworked rings are completed. Finish the thread off firmly with a needle. Sew this pattern neatly on to the centre of the damask, hemming round the rings. After this is done cut the damask from underneath, and finish off neatly on the back.

For the **Outer Circle of Rings**.—Work a ring of 10 chain, 3 chain for treble, 17 treble into the ring (leave the upper part of the ring unworked in the meantime), 12 chain, slip-stitch into the tenth chain from the needle, 3 chain for treble, 17 treble into the ring, * 12 chain, slip-stitch into the tenth chain from the needle, 3 chain for treble, 17 treble into the ring; repeat from * till there are sufficient rings to go round the centre (there are 22 in the d'oyley illustrated). Turn, and into the upper part of the ring work 16 treble. Sew this row of rings on to the damask round the centre pattern, cut the linen from underneath. Hem the damask and work a line of feather-stitching round. This completes the centre.

For the **Border**—Work the large stars the same as directed for the centre star with the exception of the last row, when into the unworked half of six of the rings work 2 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble, 3 chain, 2

treble, 3 chain, 2 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble into each ring on the outside edge of the lace, and 12 treble into each of the other six rings. Join one star to another star by the sixth treble on the upper part on the last plain ring to the corresponding treble on the same ring on the previous star. After enough stars are worked and joined for the border, work round the inner part of the lace the following rounds. **1st round**—Join the thread to one of the two plain rings on the top of a star, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the next ring, * 5 chain, miss four treble on the same ring, 2 long treble (cotton twice round hook) into the next stitch, keeping the last two loops of each treble on the needle, 2 long treble into the top of the next ring. Now work off all the loops on the needle with the last two stitches of the fourth treble; 5 chain, miss four treble on the same ring as the last two treble were worked on, 2 triple treble (cotton three times over hook) in next treble, 2 triple treble in the joining of two scallops, 2 triple treble on the fourth stitch of the next (free) ring, keep the last two loops of the first five treble on the hook, and work them off with those of the sixth; 5 chain, miss four treble on the same ring, 2 long treble in next stitch, 2 long treble in next ring as before, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in top stitch of same ring, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into next ring, and repeat from *. **2nd round**—1 double crochet into each chain of the previous round. This completes the border; sew neatly to the hemmed edge of the damask.

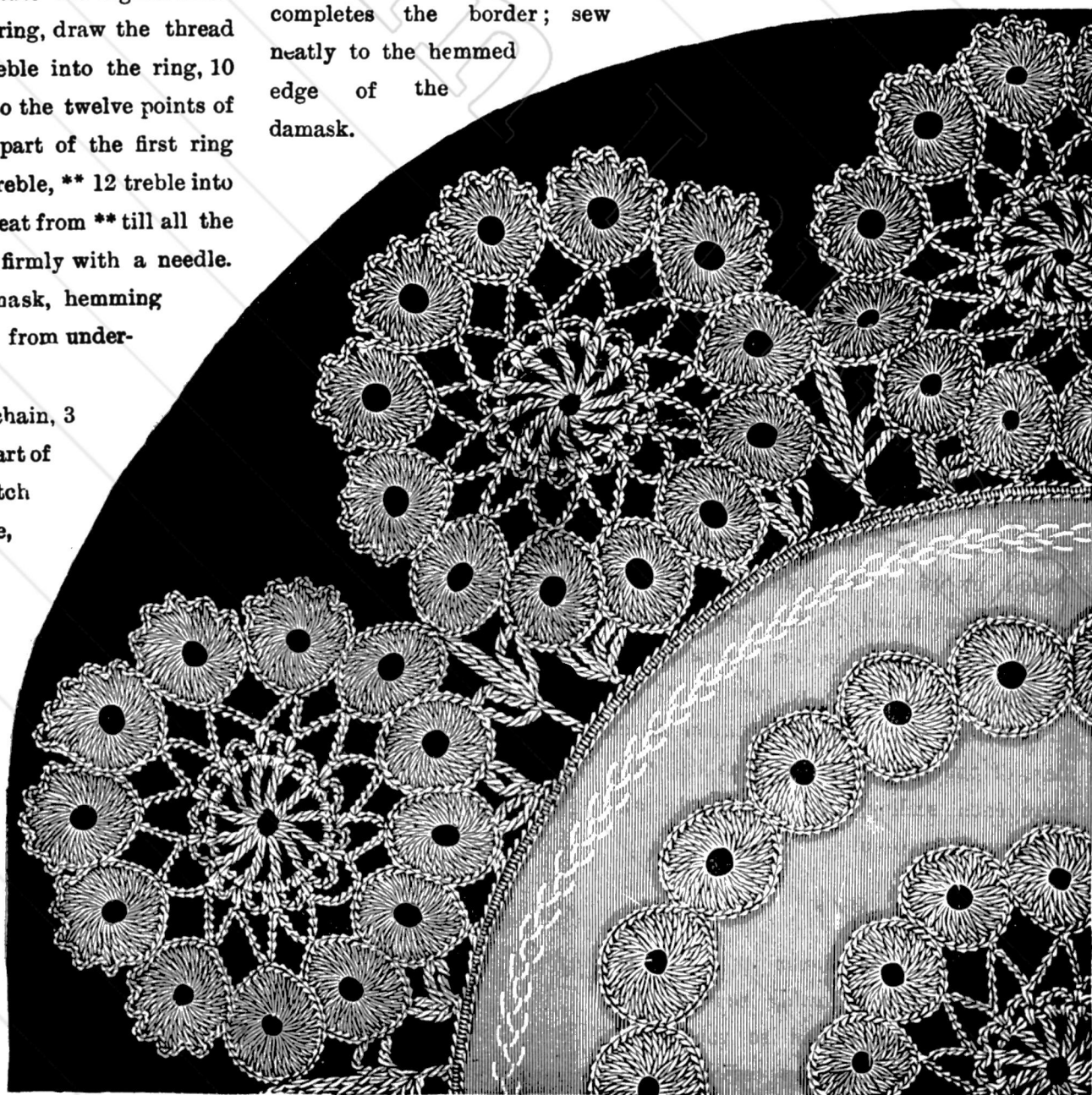


Plate d'Oyley with Star Border.

The Picot Star d'Oyley.



THE centre of this d'oyley is composed of a circular piece of damask linen and measures $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter after it is hemmed. This d'oyley when finished with the crochet measures exactly 11 inches across. A line of feather stitching is worked on the linen over the hem. On the centre of the linen is a crochet star with six points. The border is crocheted, and each pattern is worked separately and afterwards joined.

Use Coats's crochet cotton, No. 24, and a fine steel hook.

Begin with the centre pattern.

Twist the thread round a lead pencil 10 times, slip the thread off the pencil and work round the ring 24 double crochet.



2nd round—5 chain, 2 double crochet into the double crochet of the previous round, 5 chain, 2 double crochet, 5 chain, 2 double crochet, * 5 chain, 2 double crochet; repeat from * till there are twelve picots of five chain round the ring. Finish off the thread firmly with a needle. Work six stars the same as directed round the centre pattern, joining them by one picot to the centre star and by one picot to each other, leaving one free picot between each joining. After the round of six stars is completed, work six other stars, joining one star between each two stars of the previous row, leaving one free picot between the joining on each row. This forms the six points round the centre star. After this is completed place the pattern exactly on the centre of the linen and sew it firmly and neatly round. Cut the damask from underneath the crochet work and hem it down neatly on the wrong side.

Hem the outer edge of the damask and work a line of feather-stitching. This completes the centre portion, which is now ready for the border.



The stars on the border are worked exactly the same as directed for the centre.



Work a ring of stars large enough to go round the damask without undue fulness or stretching; above this work a second ring of stars, each of which is to be attached by picots between the stars of the previous round, in the same manner as for the pattern in the centre of the d'oyley. The third round consists of two stars placed at intervals between three stars of the second round; then, to complete each scallop, attach a single star between each two of previous round.

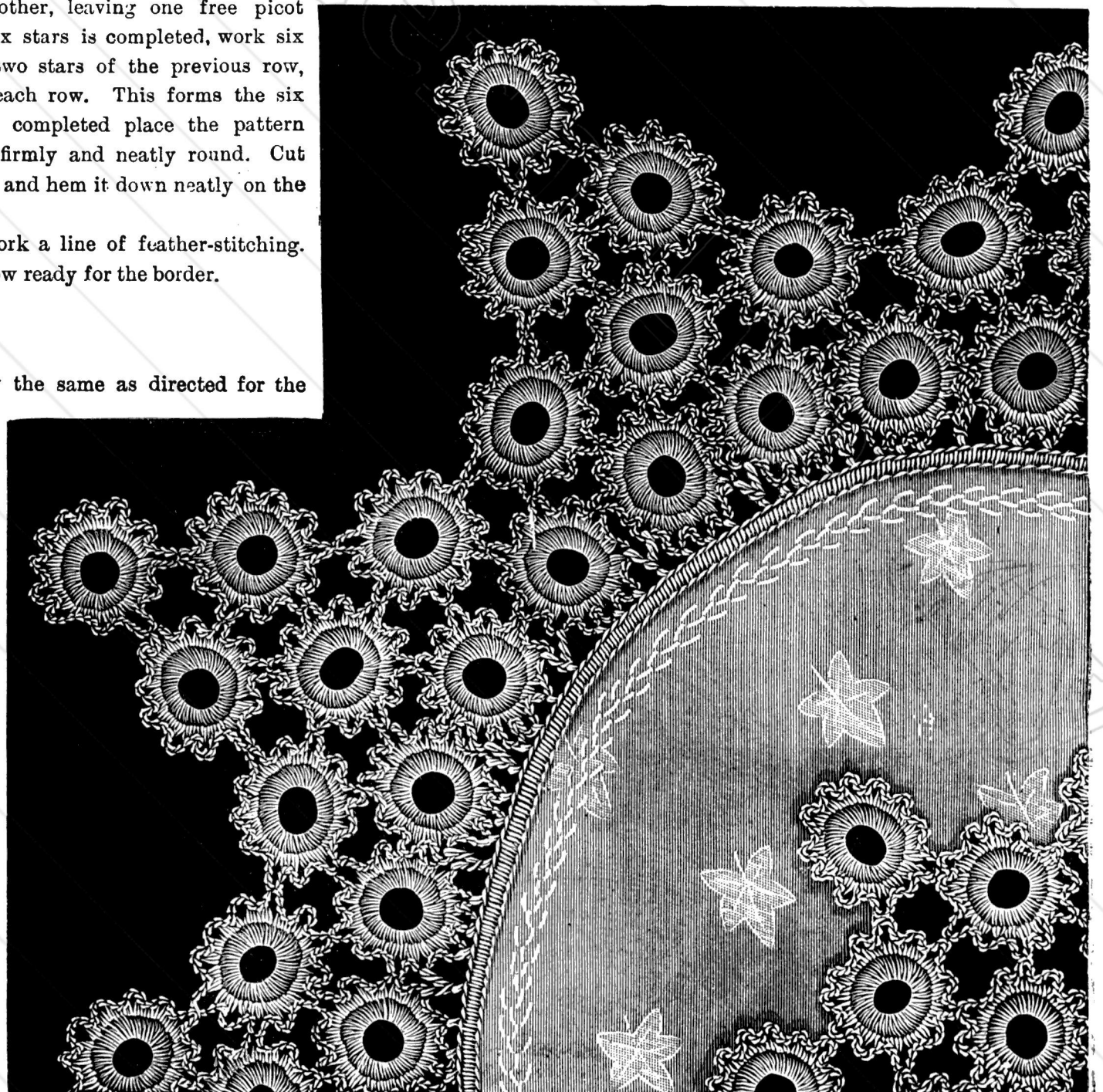


Now along the inner edge of the border work the following rounds. **1st round**—Join the thread to the second free picot on the top of a star, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the

next picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the next picot, 1 treble into the first free picot on the next star, keep the last two loops of the first treble on the hook, and work them off with the second treble, 3 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, * 3 chain, 1 treble into the next picot, 1 treble into the first free picot on the next star, 3 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot. Repeat from * to the end of the round. **2nd round**—1 double crochet into each stitch of the previous round. Now sew the lace neatly round the damask, taking care not to have more fulness in one part than in another.



This crochet is handsome enough to arrange as a collar, yoke, plastron, etc., or it would make a most effective lace edging in white or écreu cotton, then it could also be worked in black, white, or coloured silk as a dress trimming. Worked in coarse écreu cotton, it is very handsome for trimming curtains and blinds. In quite fine cotton it looks lacy enough to trim a handkerchief.



Picot Star d'Oyley.

D'Oyley with Star Insertion.

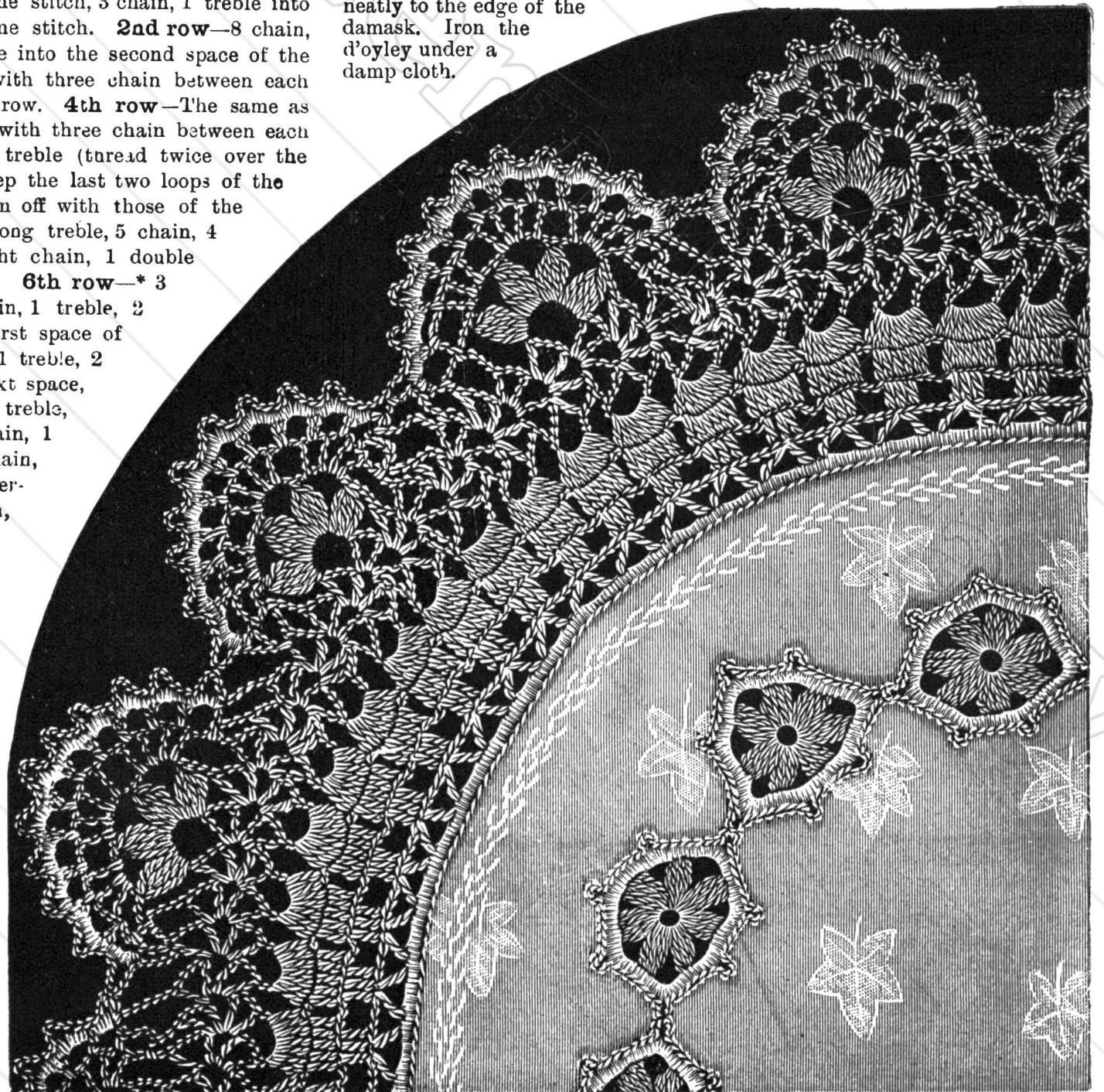


OUR illustration is made with a damask centre measuring $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter when hemmed, while the d'oyley itself measures 11 inches. An insertion of stars is let into the damask, and it is finished off with a neat line of feather-stitching.

For the **Insertion**—Work 8 chain, join into a ring by a slip-stitch. **1st round**—Work 4 chain for a long treble, 3 long treble (cotton twice over the needle) into the ring, keep the last two loops of each long treble on the needle, and work them off with those of the fourth; 4 chain, 4 long treble into the ring, as before, *4 chain, 4 long treble into the ring. Repeat from * until there are seven clusters of four long treble in the ring. **2nd round**—4 double crochet over the first space, 4 chain, 4 double crochet over the same space, 4 double crochet over the next space, 4 chain, 4 double crochet over the same space, *4 double crochet over the next space, 4 chain, 4 double crochet over the same space. Repeat from * over each space round the star. Finish off the thread firmly with a needle. In working the next star join it to the first star by the picot of four chain to the corresponding picot on the first star. Leave two free picots on the inside of the insertion, and three free picots on the outside of the insertion. It takes twelve stars to form a circle as large as that illustrated. Tack the crochet on the damask, and hem the outer edge of each star down invisibly, then on the wrong side cut away the damask beneath each pattern, turn in the edge and hem round, thus making the crochet transparent. Hem the outer edge of the damask, and finish with a line of feather-stitching.

For the **Border**—Work 10 chain—**1st row**—1 treble into the tenth chain from the needle, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch. **2nd row**—8 chain, 4 treble with three chain between each treble into the second space of the previous row. **3rd row**—8 chain, 4 treble with three chain between each treble into the second space of the previous row. **4th row**—The same as the third row. **5th row**—8 chain, 4 treble with three chain between each treble over the second space, 3 chain, 4 long treble (thread twice over the needle) over the first space of eight chain, keep the last two loops of the first three treble on the needle and work them off with those of the fourth; 5 chain, 4 long treble, 5 chain, 4 long treble, 5 chain, 4 long treble over the same space of eight chain, 1 double crochet over the next space of ten chain. **6th row**—* 3 chain for treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble over the first space of the previous row, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble over the last space, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion. **7th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space, 3 chain, miss one space, 1 double crochet; 5 chain, 1 double crochet over each of the next eleven spaces, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the space of eight chain. **8th row**—3 chain, 2 double crochet, 5 chain, 2 double crochet over each space of the previous row, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion. **9th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion. **10th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion. **11th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion. **12th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the

insertion. **13th row**—8 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second space on the insertion, 3 chain, 4 long treble over the space of ten chain, 5 chain, 4 long treble, 5 chain, 4 long treble, 5 chain, 4 long treble over the same space, 1 double crochet over the next space. Repeat from * at the beginning of the sixth row. Join the scallops to each other by the last picot on the previous scallop to the first picot on the scallop being worked. After enough lace is worked, join it neatly. Round the upper part of the lace work the following rows: **1st row**—Join the thread to one of the spaces of eight chain, 7 treble into the first space, 7 treble over the next space, * 7 treble over the next space. Repeat from *. **2nd row**—Slip-stitch over the first of the seven treble of the previous row, 5 treble, 2 chain, miss the last of these seven treble and the first of the next seven treble, 5 treble, 2 chain, miss the last of the seven treble and the first of the next seven treble, 5 treble, 2 chain, * miss the last of the seven treble and the first of the next seven treble, 5 treble, 2 chain. Repeat from *. **3rd row**—Slip-stitch over the first of the five treble of the previous row, 3 treble, 2 chain, miss the last of the five treble and the first of the next five treble, 3 treble, 2 chain, miss the last of the five treble and the first of the next five treble, 3 treble, 2 chain, * miss the last of the five treble and the first of the next five treble, 3 treble, 2 chain. Repeat from *. **4th row**—Slip-stitch over the first of the three treble, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch, miss the first of the next three treble, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch, * miss the first of the next three treble, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch. Repeat from *. **5th row**—3 double crochet over the first space of three chain, * 1 double crochet between two treble, 3 double crochet over the next space. Repeat from *. Sew neatly to the edge of the damask. Iron the d'oyley under a damp cloth.



D'Oyley with Star Insertion.

The Daisy d'Oyley.



YOUR illustration represents a damask d'oyley, with a transparent centre and border of daisies. Materials required are a piece of linen damask, Coats's crochet cotton, No. 30, and a rather fine steel hook. Hem neatly round the damask, and finish with a line of feather-stitching within the hem. Work five daisy patterns for the centre, three on either side of the five, and one between each set of three patterns. This forms a square for the centre. The damask should measure $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches across when hemmed, and the d'oyley itself when finished measures $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches. For the daisies work a ring of 8 chain.



1st round—16 double crochet over the ring.



2nd round—3 chain for treble, 1 chain, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble, * 1 chain, 1 treble; repeat from * to the end of the round.



3rd round—1 double crochet over the first space, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space, 1 double crochet over the next space, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space, * 1 double crochet over the next space, 3 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space; repeat from * to the end of the round. Join one pattern to another pattern by two picots on one pattern to the corresponding picots on the previous pattern. Sew the square of crochet work

neatly on to the damask, then cut the damask from beneath the pattern, and neatly hem the damask. The centre is now ready for the lace border.



For the **Lace**.—Begin with the centre star.

Work a ring of 12 chain.



1st round—24 double crochet over the ring.



2nd round—1 double crochet into the double crochet of the previous round, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into next three double crochet, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into the next three double crochet, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into the next three double crochet, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into the next three double crochet, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into the next three double crochet, 18 chain, 3 double crochet into the next three double crochet, 18 chain, 2 double crochet into last two double crochet, slip-stitch into the first double crochet of the round, break off the cotton neatly and securely. Thirteen of these stars will be required to go round the d'oyley. Work daisies round this star the same as directed for the centre pattern, joining one daisy to each of the eight points on the star. Join the daisies to each other by a picot on one daisy to the corresponding picot on the previous daisy. Leave on the two daisies on the top of the lace, and on the two daisies on the under part of the lace, two free picots between each joining. On the two daisies on the sides leave one free picot between each joining. Between the two daisies on the lower part of the lace join one daisy, leaving one free picot between the joining. This forms a point to the scallop. In working the second pattern for the lace, work the centre star first and join two of the points of eighteen chain to the two daisies on the side of the previous patterns. They are joined in the following way: work 9 chain, draw the thread through the picot on the daisy, 9 chain, 3 double crochet into the ring, 9 chain, draw the thread through the picot on the next daisy, 9 chain, 3 double crochet into the ring.



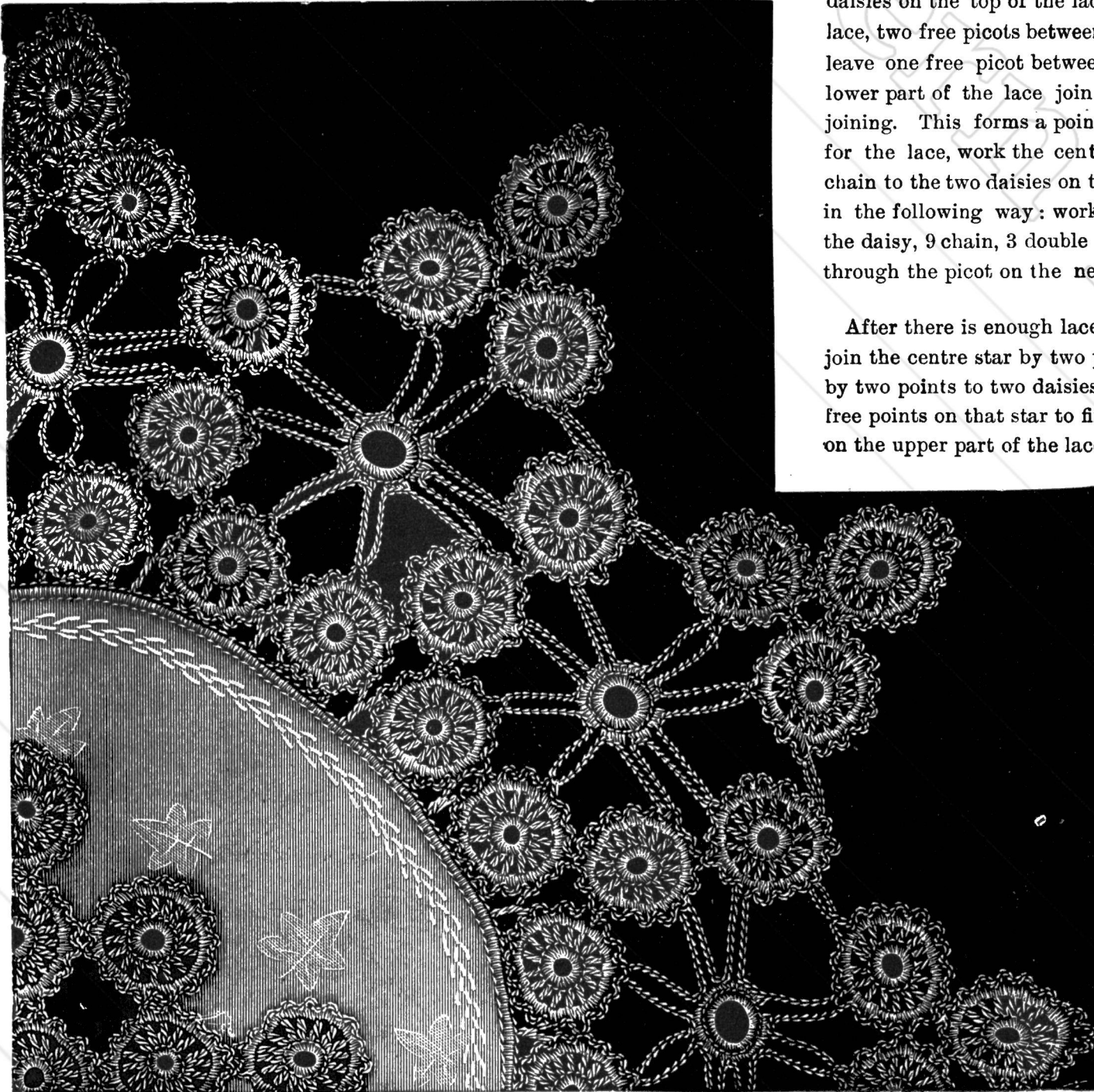
After there is enough lace worked to go round the centre, on the last scallop join the centre star by two points to two daisies on the previous scallop and by two points to two daisies on the side of the first scallop, leaving only four free points on that star to finish the scallop. Then work the following rows on the upper part of the lace:—



1st round—Join the thread to a free picot on a daisy, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into next picot, 3 chain, cotton three times over hook, miss one picot, 1 treble into next picot (this leaves three loops on the hook), 1 treble into second free picot on next daisy; then work off into a treble all the loops remaining on the hook, 3 chain, miss one picot, 1 double crochet into the next picot, * 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 2 chain, 1 double crochet into the next picot, 3 chain, miss one picot, 1 treble as before into next picot, 1 treble into the second free picot on the next daisy, 3 chain, miss one picot, 1 double crochet into the next picot. Repeat from * to the end of the round.



2nd round—1 double crochet into each chain on the previous round. Now sew the lace neatly round the centre, taking care not to have more fulness in one place than in another. This completes the d'oyley.



The Daisy d'Oyley.

Oval d'Oyley for a Small Dish.



THIS d'Oyley is suitable for a breakfast dish. The lace edge is made and afterwards sewn on to the damask centre. The materials required are Coats's crochet cotton, No. 30, with a fine steel hook, an oval piece of damask, measuring $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches after it has been hemmed, which finish round with a line of feather-stitching. The d'Oyley, when finished, measures 10 by 8 inches. Work 14 chain.

1st row—3 chain for treble, 2 chain, miss two chain, 4 treble, keep the last two loops of the first three treble on the needle, and work them off with those of the fourth (work all the groups of treble throughout the lace in the same way), 3 chain, 4 treble into the same stitch, 7 chain, miss seven chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble into the same stitch, 2 chain, miss two chain, 1 treble.

2nd row—5 chain, 4 treble over the first space of three chain, between eight treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the same space, 7 chain, miss seven chain, 4 treble over the next space of three chain, 3 chain, 4 treble over the same space, 2 chain, miss two chain, 1 treble.

3rd row—5 chain, 4 treble over the first space of three chain, 3 chain, 4 treble over the same space, 4 chain, take up the fourth stitch of the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space of three chain, 2 chain, 1 treble.

4th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, miss seven chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

5th row—This row begins the scallop. Work 10 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

6th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch of the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble, * 3 chain, 4 treble over the space of ten chain; repeat from * till there are seven groups of four treble, then 3 chain, slip-stitch into the treble on the insertion.

7th row—3 chain, slip-stitch into the next treble on the previous row on the insertion, 5 chain and 4 treble over each of the eight spaces round the scallop, then 5 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

8th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble, 7 chain, 1 double crochet over each of the nine spaces round the scallop, 7 chain, slip-stitch into the treble on the insertion.

9th row—3 chain, slip-stitch into the next treble on the previous row on the insertion, 4 chain, 1 double crochet over the first space of seven chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 6 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space, * 4 chain, 1 double crochet over the next space, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 6 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space; repeat from * over each of the spaces of seven chain round the scallop, 4 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch on the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

10th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

11th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

12th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch of the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

13th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

14th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

15th row—** 10 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch on the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

16th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble, * 3 chain, 4 treble over the space of ten chain; repeat from * till there are seven groups of four treble; 3 chain, slip-stitch into the treble on the insertion.

17th row—3 chain, slip-stitch into the next treble on the previous row of the insertion, 5 chain, 4 treble over each of the

next eight spaces, 5 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

18th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch on the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble, 7 chain, 1 double crochet over each of the next nine spaces, 7 chain, slip-stitch into the treble on the insertion.

19th row—5 chain, slip-stitch into the next treble on the previous row of the insertion, * 4 chain, 1 double crochet over the next space, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 6 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space; repeat from * into each of the spaces of seven chain round the scallop, 4 chain, 1 treble into the first treble on the insertion, 2 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

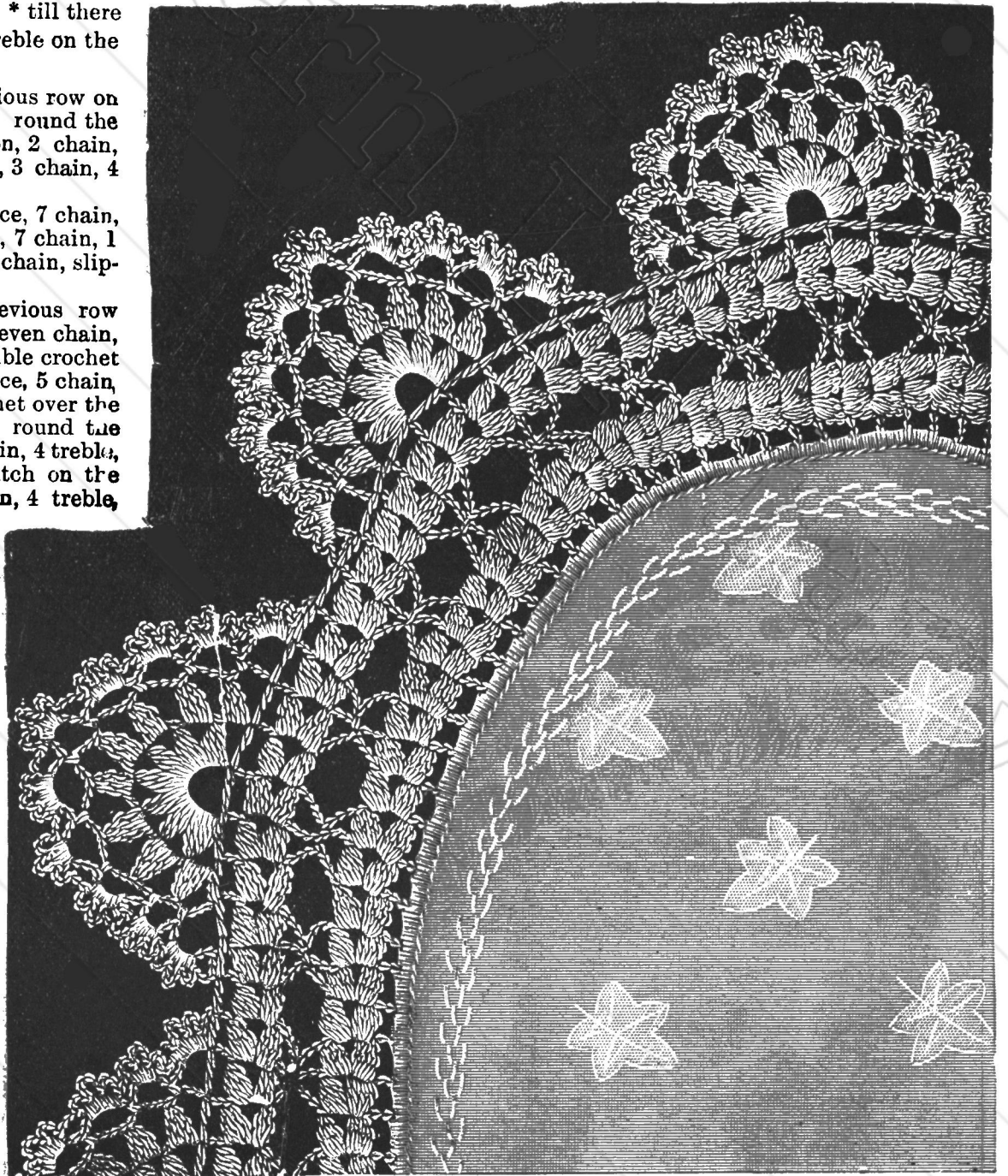
20th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

21st row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain; take the fourth stitch on the two previous lines of seven chain with 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

22nd row—* 5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

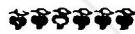
23rd row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 7 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble.

24th row—5 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the first space, 4 chain, take the fourth stitch on the two previous lines on the insertion with a double crochet, 3 chain, 4 treble, 3 chain, 4 treble over the next space, 2 chain, 1 treble; repeat from * at the beginning of the twenty-second row for the insertion, and from ** at the beginning of the fifteenth row for the scallops. The worker will observe that the rows on the insertion will not come the same over each scallop. As, however, there are only three different rows on the insertion, and these three are easily remembered, the worker will find no difficulty in bringing them right. Leave one free row on the insertion between each scallop. Work five rows on the insertion before commencing a scallop. After enough lace is worked to go round the damask, join it neatly with a needle and thread. Work round the inner part of the lace four double crochet over each space; now sew the lace round the damask and this completes the d'Oyley.



Oval d'Oyley for Small Dish

Plate d'Oyley with Picot Insertion.



THIS useful d'oyley is made with a centre of damask linen, crossed with an insertion of crochet work. The d'oyley, when completed, measures 10½ inches across from point to point. The edge of the damask is feather-stitched. Use Coats's cotton, No. 24, with a fine steel hook.

For the insertion across the centre of the d'oyley:—**1st row**—Work 12 chain, 1 treble into the sixth chain from the needle, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same chain, 5 chain, miss five chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, all into the same stitch. **2nd row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot of five chain, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, miss five chain, 1 double crochet over the space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, all over the same space. **3rd row**—* 6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot of five chain, 3 chain, 1 treble over the same space, 5 chain, miss five chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, all over the same space. Repeat from *. Work enough insertion to cross the centre of the d'oyley, join the thread first to one side, then to the other side on the middle of the insertion, and work enough to cross in the opposite way (see illustration). Sew the work on to the centre of the damask, then cut the damask from beneath it. Hem the damask with a very narrow hem, and finish with a line of feather-stitching between the insertion.

For the **Border**—**1st row**—Work 11 chain, 1 treble into the sixth chain from the needle, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same stitch, 5 chain, miss five chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the same stitch. **2nd row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot of five chain, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the next space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space. **3rd row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space. **4th row**—6 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble over the second picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space. **5th row**—* 6 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space, 4 chain, 1 double crochet over the six chain of the previous row; turn, over this chain work 7 double crochet; turn, work 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space of six chain, over this chain work 9 double crochet; turn, 8 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space of six chain, over this chain work 11 double crochet; turn, work 10 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space of six chain, over this chain work 15 double crochet, turn, work 11 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space of six chain, over this chain work 17 double crochet; then 3 chain for treble, 2 chain and 1 treble between each of the lines of double crochet, 2 chain, 1 treble over the space after the last line of double crochet, 5 treble in all; 3 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the last space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space. **6th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space, 2 chain and 1 treble over each of the next five spaces, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble, 2 chain, 1 treble over the sixth space, 2 chain, miss two double crochet, 1 treble, 2 chain, miss two double crochet, 1 treble, 2 chain, miss two double crochet, 1 treble, 2 chain, miss two double

crochet, 1 treble, 2 chain, miss two double crochet, 1 treble, 2 chain, miss two double crochet, 1 treble, 1 double crochet over the space of six chain on the insertion; turn, work 5 chain, 1 double crochet over each of the first seven spaces, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the eighth space, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over each of the next seven spaces, 3 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the last space of three chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the same space. **7th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the last space. **8th row**—6 chain, 1 treble into the second picot, 3 chain, 1 treble into the same picot, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet over the last space; repeat from * at the beginning of the fifth row.

To join one scallop to another scallop, in working the last row of 5 chain, 1 double crochet over each space, work 3 chain, draw the thread through the last picot on the previous scallop, 2 chain, 1 double crochet over the first space. Join the lace neatly, and round the inner edge work—**1st round**: Join the thread to one of the spaces of six chain, 3 chain for treble, 1 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble over this same space, 2 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble over the next space, * 2 treble, 3 chain, 2 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **2nd round**—3 chain for treble, 1 treble, 2 chain, 2 treble over the first space of three chain between four treble on the previous round, 2 treble, 2 chain, 2 treble over the next space, * 2 treble, 2 chain, 2 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. **3rd round**—3 chain for treble, 1 treble, 2 chain, 2 treble over the first space, 2 treble, 2 chain, 2 treble over the next space; repeat from * to the end of the round. Sew the crochet neatly to the damask centre. This completes the d'oyley.

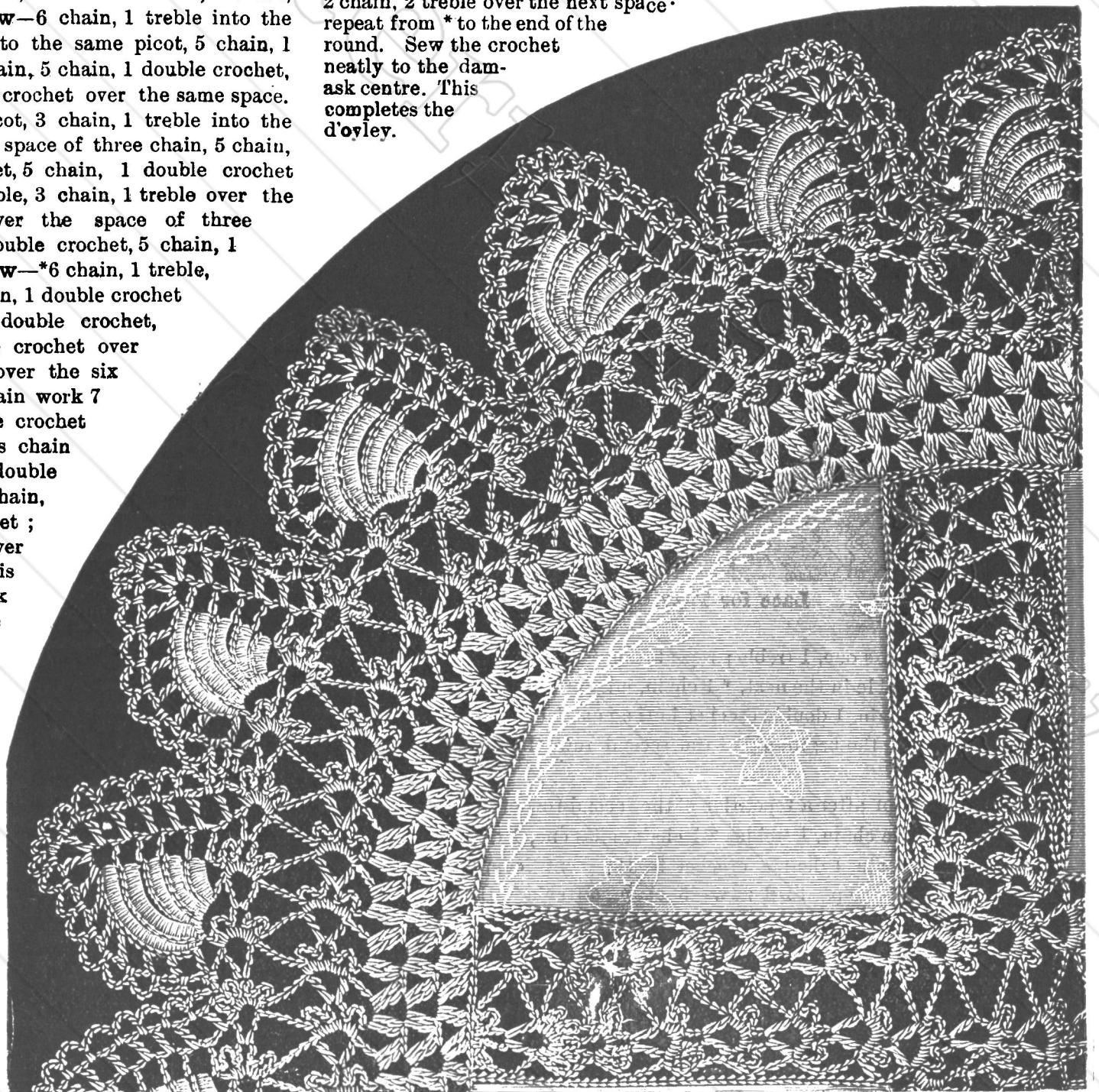
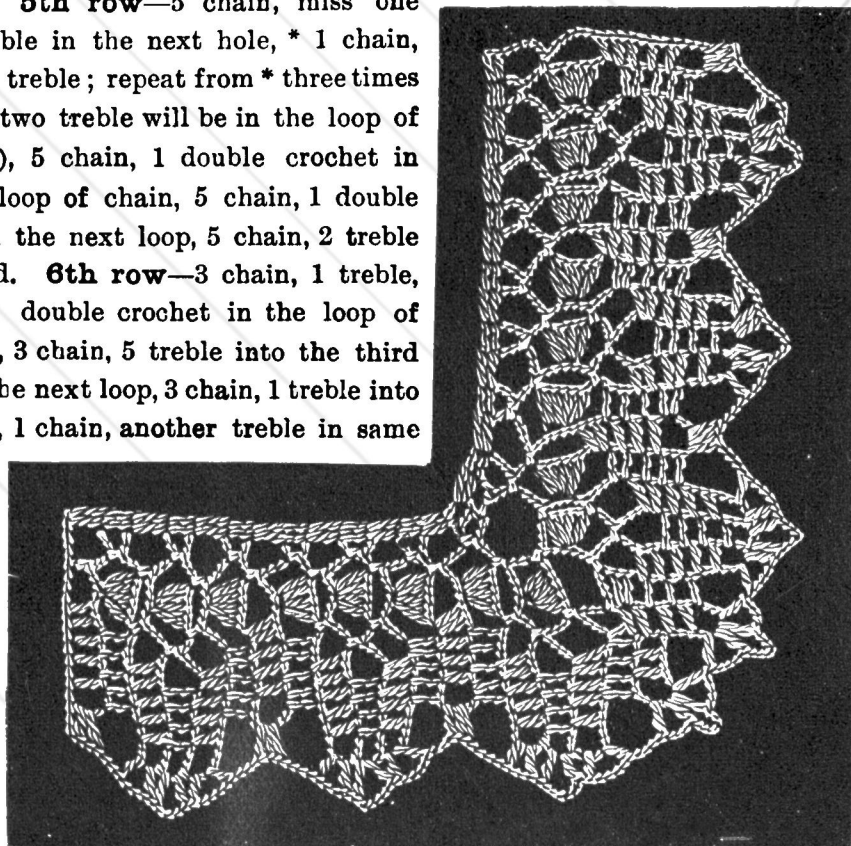


Plate d'Oyley with Picot Insertion.

Lace for Tray Cloths.



THIS is a very pretty lace for trimming small d'oyleys, tray cloths, side-board slips, etc. When worked with Ardern's crochet cotton, No. 30, it is only about an inch wide. It does not look so pretty in any size of cotton lower than No. 20. Make a foundation of 23 chain. **1st row**—Miss five chain, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, 5 chain, miss three, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, miss three, 2 treble. **2nd row**—3 chain, 1 treble on the top of the next treble of the last row, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of five chain, 3 chain, 5 treble into the third stitch of the next loop, 3 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat three times from *, the last two treble being worked into the loop of chain at the end of the preceding row. **3rd row**—8 chain, miss five chain, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet into the next loop of chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of chain, 5 chain, 2 treble over the last treble of the preceding row. **4th row**—3 chain, 1 treble on the top of the treble of the last row, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of five chain, 3 chain, 5 treble into the third stitch of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole; repeat from * twice, then 1 chain, 1 treble again into the last hole. **5th row**—5 chain, miss one hole, 1 treble in the next hole, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times (the last two treble will be in the loop of five chain), 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop of chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 2 treble at the end. **6th row**—3 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of five chain, 3 chain, 5 treble into the third stitch of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 treble into next loop, 1 chain, another treble in same



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place, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * twice. **7th row**—5 chain, miss one hole, 1 treble in the next, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 2 treble at end. Repeat from the beginning of the second row till enough of the lace is made.

Begin the **Corner** after a repetition of the second row of the lace. **1st row**—8 chain, miss five chain, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop. **2nd row**—5 chain, 5 treble in the third stitch of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the next loop, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, the last two treble being in the loop at the end of the last row. **3rd row**—5 chain, miss one hole, 1 treble in the next, * 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble; repeat from * three times, the last two treble being in the loop of five chain, then 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of chain before the group of five treble. **4th row**—5 chain, miss two chain of the last loop of the third row, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss

one, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble. **5th row**—5 chain, miss one hole, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble. **6th row**—Do not turn as usual, but work 8 chain, miss five of these chain, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble over the last treble of the preceding row, 2 chain, 1 double crochet in the large loop of chain. **7th row**—5 chain, 1 treble in the next chain after the double crochet of the preceding row, 1 chain, 1 treble in the same loop, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the last loop. **8th row**—8 chain, miss five of these chain, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 1 chain, miss one, 1 treble, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the last loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop after the group of five treble. **9th row**—4 chain, 5 treble in the third stitch of the next loop, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of five chain, 5 chain, miss two treble, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the same hole. **10th row**—5 chain, miss one hole, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next hole, 1 chain, 1 treble in the next loop of chain, 1 chain, 1 treble in the same loop, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of chain before the five treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of chain after the five treble, 5 chain, 1 double crochet in the loop of chain before the two treble at the edge of the border, 3 chain, 2 treble over the last of the two end treble. Repeat now from the beginning of the sixth row of the lace.

For the finish to the lace along the vandyked edge, work as follows: * 3 treble in the hole at the margin between two scallops, 3 chain, 1 treble in the first of the three holes at the top of the next vandyke, 3 chain, 1 treble in the same hole, 1 treble in the next hole, 5 chain, 1 treble in the same hole, 1 treble in the next hole, 3 chain, 1 treble in the same hole, 3 chain; repeat from *. In each of the larger loops in the two small vandykes in the corners put 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble, 5 chain, 1 treble, 3 chain, 1 treble. No group of three treble is to be worked between these two small vandykes or between them and the next large points.

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
